CHISOX CROWNED '48 CHAMPS IN 5-GAME TRIUMPH OVER FEDERALS

The purgatory of the Chicago White Sox is over! After having seen the 1947 World Series slip through their fingers, the Pale Hose of Frank Papp held strong and brought the 1948 SPB-II championship to the Windy City.

Jerry Dailey's Fairfield Federals fell victim to a balanced Sox attack and strong pitching over the five-game series. Chicago batted .349 over the five games, led by Bob Elliott's .625 mark with 2 HRs and a series high 7 RBI, enough to garner the MVP Award.

While the Sox crushed the ball, the Feds were no slouches either, posting a .301 mark. However, while the Sox kept their ERA at 2.886, the Federal hurlers were hammered at a 6.43 clip.

Stan Musial of the Feds, leading candidate for '48 MVP honors, was "held" to a .300 average for the series, being out-hit by four Federal regulars. Ken Keltner and Hoot Evers each hit .400 over the series.

The the red-white-and-blue buating strung along the fences down the first and third bases lines and hanging from the rafters in the outfield, Ebbets Field and Bedford Avenue provided the perfect setting for the opener of the Fall Classic. With the field slick from early morning rain and the wind blowing in from the famed RF scoreboard, the Federals took the home opener, 9-4.

Rookie sensation Gene Bearden got the cal for the Federals against Preacher Roe. It was a tough start for the Sox southpaw who yielded a leadoff single to to Mike McCormick and then saw Harry Walker reach when Bob Elliott booted a tap to 3B. Visibly shaken, Roe moved the runners up with a wild pitch and then grooved one to Keltner who slammed it high into the LF seats for a 3-0 Feds lead. After a Hoot Evers single and steal, Bob Scheffing singled him home and took taking 2B on the Ted Williams throw home. Granny Hamner slapped another hit for a 5-0 lead and finished Roe's work.

After a 51 minute rain delay in the 3rd, Bearden was pulled and relieved by Nelson Potter who was nailed for an RBI 2B by Walker Cooper to score Williams from 3B. Tommy Henrich was nailed at the plate on an Evers-Eddie Miller-Scheffing relay play to close the inning.

Hank Borowy came on in the 4th for the Sox and gave up an RBI single to Walker, but back came Chicago, down 6-1. Singles by Eddie Lake and Hal Jeffcoat and a SF by Henrich brought in one before Elliott and Eddie Waitkus cut the margin to 6-4 with RBI singles. Feds got an IF grounder to make it 7-4 in the bottom.

To start things out I would like to announce that the proposition on the use of DMB Version 7 has been passed and accepted. The vote was 25-5. Thanks everyone, for your input.

Next, I would like to inform everyone that being Commissioner is tough! I consider all of you my friends, and it is particularly hard to make decisions on disputes that come up. In the last month, I've had two separate cases that required difficult decisions on two entirely separate matters.

One was over League policy concerning the use of Version 7. There is a manager out there who strongly lobbied, not only for its use, but for immediate incorporation into SPB '60 since we're only in the beginning of this League. I told him no this would begin with '70, then '49, '29, and '61 in that order. Finally, I ended up coming on a little strong that this would not be used until the '61 season, not for '60. My reasons are based on the best interest of the League, which is what being Commissioner is all about. So please understand fellows that there are thirty managers in this League who depend on me to keep the continuity of SPB flowing in the right direction. Don't take it personally if I come on too strong sometimes, it's part of this job.

The other dispute was between two managers and involved the playing of a series. Again, this is different, but presents more of a problem because both managers swear they did things correctly, and I believe them. But I think that sometimes with the transferring of files a wrong button may be pnsbed and things get a little screwy,

This is the latest possible time we can have the draft and still have time to study the League and make trades before the October 1st starting date. One of our members will be out of the country from the 5th through the 24th, so this is really the only shot. Sorry about any inconvenience this causes some of you. If you plan on participating by list please have it to me no later than August 28th, a Thursday. Or let me know how you plan to take care of it.

1948 World Series From P.1

Ewell Blackwell, who suffered through the '48 campaign with an arm injury, got some work, tossing a perfect 6th inning. However, he was PH for and Paul Minner came on in the 7th. After picking up two easy groundouts, he walked Keltner. Evers then singled to CF and the runners ended up at second and third on Jeffcoat's error. Miller took advantage and singled both home to make it 9-4.

Mel Parnell finished up for the Feds and picked up the win with 3 scoreless, 2-hit innings.

Elliott had his showcase game in the second contest, going 4-for-5 with a pair of HRs and driving in four. Vern Bickford got the Sox nod against Sam Zoldak and Elliott's 2nd inning solo was all the scoring until the 6th. Henrich then followed Williams' leadoff single with a 2-run shot over the RF scoreboard and after Elliott singled, Walt Masterson came on for the Feds. After one out on a sac by Cooper, Waitkus doubled in one and Lipon singled in another for a 5-0 Sox lead.

Chicago added 2 more in the 7th on Elliott's 2-run shot off Emil Kush while the Feds picked up one in the 7th on a Miller grounder to make it 7-1. After Kush got the first two in the 8th, Lake and Jeffcoat walked and Miller's throwing error loaded the bases. Henrich walked to force in a run, Elliott singled in another and Cooper finished the scoring with a 2-run single. Feds got a meaningless run in the 8th to close the scoring at 11-2 Chicago to knot the series.

The series moved to Chicago after a day off and Comiskey Park saw Allie Reynolds take the mound for the Feds against Vic Raschi. After a shaky 1st inning, where he allowed three straight singles to start the game with an RBI single to Musial and Keltner SF making it 2-0, he zipped the Feds the rest of the way.

Tigers trade Billy Pierce to the White Sox for Aaron Robinson. Detroit throws in \$100,000... Lou Boudreau is selected AL MVP. Boudreau had almost been traded to the Browns earlier in the season, but fan protests kept him in Cleveland.....

May 1960-The Cubs pluck Boudreau out of the broadcast booth to replace Charley Grimm as field manager. Grimm goes behind the mike...Gus Triandos sets a major league record with 3 PBs in one inning (6th) and 4 in a game as Hoyt Wilhelm makes a rare start. A week later, Joe Ginsberg ties the one-inning record with Wilhelm on the mound. By the end of May, Paul Richards has devised the new oversized mitt which is 40 ounces heavier than the standard mitt.... The Phillies lose 3 straight 1-0 games, two to the Giants and the final to the Reds... Two days after being traded from the Phils to the Cubs, Don Cardwell no-hits the Cardinals. A great leaping catch by George Altman robs Carl Sawatski and preserves the gem...George Crowe sets the ML record with his 1th career PH HR. It comes off Don McMahon of the Braves....Pirates acquire Vinegar Bend Mizell and Dick Gray from the Cardinals for Javier and Ed Bauta... Casey Stengel misses 13 games while he is hospitalized with the flu. The Yanks go 7-6 under interim skipper Ralph Houk.

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1948 World Series From P.2

With two down in the 2nd, Ron Northey 2B'd and Birdie Tebbetts singled him home. Lipon got an IW and it backfired as Raschi and Eddie Stanky gave Chicago a 3-2 lead with RBI singles. They added two more in the 3rd on Elliott's RBI 3B and Northey's run scoring single. One more in the 4th on a throwing error by Larry Doby in CF trying to nail Stanky at 3B and another in the 5th on a Lipon SF off Masterson for the 7-2 final.

Would game 4 be *deja vu* for the Sox? The palms were getting sweaty and the mind began to race as visions of '47 popped into Frank Papp's head when the Sox jumped out to a 9-0 lead before an SRO crowd at Comiskey and a game that appeared to be a laugher almost turned into a nightmare before hanging on, 9-6.

Roe began this one as he had the opener, giving up singles to McCormick and Evers, but got a break when Keltner bunted the runners along. McCormick was then gunned down at the plate by Elliott as he tried to score on Musial's bouncer. The momentum had swung and Bearden was hammered for 4 runs when Jeffcoat followed Stanky's leadoff triple with a single. After Williams hit into a line drive DP to Hamner at 2B, Henrich doubled, Elliott got four free ones and Cooper launched a 3-run HR for the 4-0 lead.

Bearden left after an RBI 2B in the 5th by Henrich and Johnny Schmitz came on to yield a 2B to Elliot and extend the lead to 6-0. Schmitz was touched for leadoff singles in the 6th by Waitkus and Bobby Sturgeon and Roe moved them to 2nd and 3rd where they scored on Stanky's single. Jeffcoat got a bunt single and on came Masterson who got out of the inning after an RBI grounder by Henrich with the Sox up by nine.

The fireworks began when Papp decided to pull Roe and rest him in the event a 7th game might be necessary and the bullpen, a thorn for the Sox again this year, caved in. Al Widmar gave up 3 singles with Walker's bringing in a run. After a DP grounder, Gene Hermanski's grounder was booted by

Elliott at 3B for another run. Scheffing singled and Neil Berry drove home Hermanski with a two-bagger. Tom Ferrick got out of the inning, but was roughed up in the 9th when he kicked Evers' bunt and Keltner crushed a 2-run HR, followed by a Musial shot onto Bedford Avenue.

He then got Walker and Miller on grounders, but loaded the bases on a Nelson Potter single and walks to Scheffing and Berry. The call again went to the pen and on came Ernie White who picked up a save by getting McCormick to sky to RF. It was the only batter he faced in the series as Chicago took a seemingly commanding 3-1 lead.

Another SRO at Comiskey Park for game 5 as the faithful hoped to celebrate a title. Crafty lefty Mel Parnell got the call for the Federals against Dick Fowler who was shaky in the 2nd. He walked Sheffing and gave up an RBI 2B to Hamner for the 1-0 Fairfield lead, but helped tie the game in the 3rd with a 2-out single. Stanky followed with another and Peanuts Lowery drove in Fowler with the third single of the stanza.

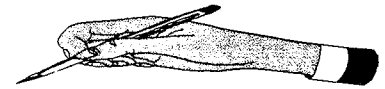
Fowler almost got the hook in the 5th, but with the shaky Chicago bullpen hastily getting warm, Papp kept him in. Parnell had led with a single, moved up on a McCormick sac and scored on an Evers single. Musial the smacked his 2nd WS HR for a 4-1 Federals lead. Two more singles by the Feds, but Miller grounded out to end the inning.

Sox got two back on RBI singles by Lowery and Williams and it stayed 4-3 Feds into the 7th. With two Feds on base and hoping to crack it open, Blackwell, this year's Sox over-achiever, came on to whip Doby with a DP grounder and close the inning on a Scheffing fly to LF.

Parnell got one quick out in the bottom half, but Blackwell came through with a single. After Stanky skied out, Lowery got his 3rd hit of the afternoon before Williams tied it at 4-4 with a single. Henrich almost broke it open here, but
