## Express Sluggers Star in '58 Start - More No-Hitters in '58 and '46!!!

Both 1957 Divisional winners, the eventual SPB champion Cubs and the West winning Falcons each got off to sluggish starts in the 1958 campaign.

Rick Ryan's Cubbies awoke from their winter slumber and crawled from the cave in deliberate fashion, finishing the month at 14-11. Frank Papp's Falcons are going through a bit of rebuilding in '58 and had their talons clipped, sharing a 9-16 mark with both the Albions and Black Sox.

Jim Wheeler's Pelicans, who crash landed just short of the East title in '57, jumped out to a 2-game lead over the surprising Orient Express and Blue Sox. Out West, Bob Calicchia's Rifles held a slim 1-game lead over the Saxons and Cascades.

There was also a bevy of no-hitters in both the 1946 and 1958 seasons. On page 10, the scoresheets for the no-nos tossed by Hal Newhouser (Falcons vs. Hornets), Orval Grove (Gold Sox vs. Monarchs), Paul Foytack (Cubs vs. Falcons) are reprinted.

In '58, Stan Musial held a lead over Bob Nieman with a .391-.382 margin. He's added 10 doubles and leads with 36 hits. Rocky Colavito of the Grays provides a glimmer of hope in Providence as he leads with 25 RBI on the strength of 8

HRs. Roger Maris leads in HRs with 10 while Mickey Mantle attempts to rebound from an average 1957 and is second in HRs with 9. He has also stolen 10-of-11 bases, tied for the lead with Willie Mays.

From the hill, the Blue Sox Bob Rush leads with a 0.63 ERA, but is closely tailed by the Pelicans Johnny Podres. Podres and Tom Acker (Evanston) lead the pack with 4-0 records with 4 others at 4-1 and Robin Roberts already at 4-2.

## Joe D. Goes Wild at the Plate— '46 Races Hit Crunch Time

After the first month of intradivisional play, both 1946 pennant races narrowed down to two teams each. In the East, the Frankfort Fortress finally shook off a season-long lethargy and took a one and a half game lead over the Dodgers (Note: Fortress played 28 games in the July schedule while the Dodgers took the field only 21 times).

Over in the West, the Marauders maintained the lead, now down to three over the surging Elephants. Both the Gold Sox in the East and Whales in the West couldn't keep up, each falling far back and will be completely out of the race unless they can post a August and September.

Mickey Vernon of the Federals continues to lead the batting race with a .397 mark while Joe DiMaggio of the Elephants has a wide lead with 33 HRs. Joltin' Joe's 107 RBI are 27 greater than the number two man, Frankfort's Charlie Keller! Johnny Schmitz of the Federals leads the league with 15 wins.

The Elephants overcame a 9-5 deficit by scoring 3 runs in the last of the 8th and 2 in the 9th to pull out a 10-9 victory over the White Sox. In the third game of the same series, Evanston's Hank Edwards didn't hit for the cycle, but he did everything else with a double, two triples, two homers, four runs and four RBI. Later in the series, Bob Feller smoked a 5-hit shutout, striking out 14 in the process

In a game against the crosstown Evanston Trees, the Elephants' Bill Bevins took a no-hitter until 2 out in the 9th before Lou Boudreau spoiled it with a clean single to left and Bevins had to settle for a one-hitter.

The Pacyderms had several exciting games against the Marauders, including a 14-11 slugfest win and a 6-5 triumph in which they scored 3 in the top of the 9th.

Team of the month was no contest as Fortress went 21-7 and climbed into 1st place...Likewise, it was no contest as Joe DiMaggio had what would be a "good" season in the month of July as he hit .423 with 16 home runs and 50 RBI in just 28 games...Pitcher-of-the-Month was Hal Newhouser of the Fortress. Each time Prince Hal went to the hill, he put in a full day's work, tossing six complete games enroute to a 4-2 record with a sparkling 1.35 ERA...Junior Thompson of the Whales is making the Reliever-of-the-Month award sound like a broken record since he is one of the few true "closers" hrling during 1946.

1946- Mickey Owen quits managing job in Mexican League and he and Luis Olmo request reinstatement... Pirates are sold for a reported \$2.5 million... A single by Frank Hayes breaks up Bob Feller's no-hit bid. Hayes had caught Feller's April 30th no-hitter before being traded... On August 9th, all games are played at night for the first time in history.... In a DH sweep vs. Reds, Stan Musial get 8 hits in 9 ABs... Clubs approve change to a 168-game schedule. On Spetember 16th, the decision is rescinded. TV is first recognized, with clubs given rights to their own games. A player jumping to an outlaw league cannot request reinstatement for five years... Luke Sewell quits as Browns manager, replaced by Zack Taylor for the rest of the season...

1958- The Yankees threaten to broadcast all games nationally if the NL goes ahead with plan to permit broadcasts, especially those of Giants and Dodgers, into New York-New Jersey area... Ramon Mejias smacks 3 HRs in the opener of DH against SF... Giants trail Bucs 11-1 going into the bottom of 9th, but score 9 runs, including a HR by Orlando Cepeda. They lose when Don Taussig pops out with bases jammed to end the rally.... 19-year old Mike McCormick zips the Pirates 7-0 on a 3-hits. Cepeda hits HR in 4th straight game... Bob Skinner, Ted Kluszewski and Frank Thomas all HR in 5th inning, but Bucco lose to Giants 8-6... Willie Mays hits first grand slam in SF history to beat LA 12-3... On May 13th, Stan Musial pinch doubles off Moe Drabowsky at Wrigley for his 3,000th hit... Carroll Hardy pinch hits for Roger Maris..... Hank Aaron, Ed Mathews, Wes Covington hit successive HRs off Ron Kline.

At the opposite end of the spectrum, Jack Urban of the Black Sox was saddled with 5 losses in April.

Gene Conley has rebounded from his winter of playing on the hardwood with the Boston Celtics and is obviously in top form, leading all hurlers in strikeouts with 54, a huge 19 K lead over runners-up John Antonelli and Podres.

The new digs at the sun-drenched LA Coliseum proved quite beneficial for the Express, yet they still trailed the power-laden Tigers 35-34 in HRs for the month. Orient does lead the league in batting with a .272 mark while the Falcons are limping along with a .216 team average even with Ted Williams banging away at a .341 clip.

The Pelicans continue their pitching mastery with a remarkable 2.43 ERA with the Minors far behind in second place at 3.06 for the month. The reason for the Tigers sluggish start can be found in their pitching, last in ERA at 4.15. Except for the Express and Black Sox, each team has allowed fewer hits than innings pitched, holding the league ERA to 3.47 and batting average to a meager .247 in the cold first month.

Touching on month four of the '46 season, Johnny Hopp is second to leader Joe Di Maggio in the batting race, but trails by 45 points, even with his .352 pace. Included among Mickey Vernon's 154 hits are a league leading 43 doubles. Ted Williams of the White Sox has walked 121 times—39 more than runnes-up Charlie Keller and Elbe Fletcher. Ralph Kiner has walked back to the dugout with his head hung low 87 times. Hal Newhouser leads with a 1.78 ERA and is one behind Johnny Schmitz in wins with 14. Tommy Bridges and Kirby Higbe have each lost 13 contests.

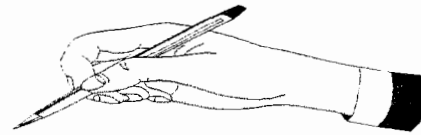
The defending champion Cubs got off to a rough start at home, posting an 8-7 mark. Cubs slugged it out with the Rifles, winning 4-1. In opener, Jim Grant went the distance as Dale Long slammed in a 17-3, 21-hit barrage. Two of 3 Rifle hits were HRs by Roger Maris... Taylor Phillips flipped a 4-1 3 hitter; Faye Throneberry's HR, the 3rd allowed by Don McMahon in series put Cubs over top 5-4. Bobby Clemente went 4-4 with a 2B, HR.. Cubs come from behind in final AB in 4th game although Roy Sievers breaks an 0-13 skid.... Rifles get out of town with some dignity, scoring 6 in 7th inning for an 8-2 win behind Vern Law.....

The Falcons came to town in a surly mood after '57 sweep and it was evident in 1st inning of opening game when Paul Foytack and Ken Boyer were ejected for fighting. Ted Williams went 5-6 with a 2B, 2 HRs and 5 RBI in 11-1 win behind newcomer Bob Purkey.. Falcons stifle Cub bats in games 2 and 3 as Frank Robinson and Boyer lead Gurnee attack... Cubs more than salvage final two winning 5-2 on Leon Wagner's PH HR. Ted Bowsfield holds on despite 7 walks... Series ends in grand fashion as Foytack, returning to hill, strikes out 6, singles in only run and fires a NO-HITTER!!!! (See Page 10)...

In the battle of the past two SPB champs, the Mavericks take 3 from Cubs, winning middle three.. Cubs win 8-2 led by Willie Mays' inside-the-park HR... Bill Mazerowski and Dick Williams lead Mavs 5-3, then erupt for 14-2 bashing as John Roseboro goes 3-4 and McDougald 3-5 with 2 HRs each. Tex Clevenger is hung out to dry, allowing 11 ERs... Herm Weh-meier allows only 2 hits over 7 in a 4-1 win... Bob Speake's PH HR in 8th of finale ties game and 9th inning PB

## The Game that Wouldn't Die!

...but it certainly killed some batting averages! Game two of the initial series pitting the two newest skippers, Mike Borges (Albions) and Bob Buonaccorsi (Minors), was a seemingly never-ending affair lasting 25 innings. It is perhaps the longest game in SPB history to date.

The scoresheet and boxscore for this one ran a total of **EIGHT** pages! Frank Lary opened for the Minors against Ike Delock. Stan Lopata singled home Bobby Thomson in the Albions 2nd for a 1-0 lead and the Minors tied in the 4th when Moose Skowron drove home Harvey Kueen. After that, it was 20 consecutive zeros for each club.

Minors loaded the bases in the 6th, but Delock fanned Kueen to stall the chance. In the 11th, Albions had the best shot to win when with 2 down and runners at 1st and 2nd, Thomson singled to LF, but Bob Martyn gunned down Orlando Cepeda at the plate. Hurler after hurler traipsed to the mound. Lary gave way to Don Ferrarese in the 10th, Bob Smith then in the 12th, Paul Giel put in 4.1 innings of work through the 17th giving way to Don Gross with 2-on, 1-out. Gross went 3.2 and then Nichols went the rest of the way. After Delock it was Curt Raydon for 4, Don Bessent for 2, Seth Morehead tossed 2, Bill Henry went a pair, George Zuverink got in three innings and Skinny Brown finished for the Albions..

The game ended in rather unique fashion in the 25th. Billy Goodman led off with a walk against the tiring Nichols and after Cepeda hit into a FC, Frank Thomas singled the runner to 3B. Thomson received an intentional pass and Lopate topped one in the infield and Goodman sent the crowd home as he

The steadily improving Monarchs had a fine 8-6 July homestand by taking the Redbirds and Gold Sox 4-3 apiece. Despite a rough start, with Orval Grove flicking a third no-hitter of the campaign, the M's bounced back in the second behind Joe Dobson's 3-hit 2-1 win. Bobby Doerr's 2-run shot won game 3 by 3-2, but Sox rebounded for a 5-0 five hit zip by Ed Head. After a win in game five, M's dropped one 4-2 as Dick Sisler and John Wyrostek did 9th inning damage. The rubber match pitted Claude Passeau- Harry Brecheen and M's came out ahead, 2-1. M's hit only .200 and Sox a mere .209 for 7 games.. Against 'Birds, M's got 3 RBI from Hank Majeski in a 9-4 win. Buster Adams' slam keyed an 8-2 Ohio win. Kirby Higbe backed up Walt Judnich's 3-run HR for a 4-0 win. Monarchs won 4th game 10-6 slugfest behind HRs from Doerr, Ed Stevens, Hal Wagner and Frank Hayes. Six miscues in contest and Joe Hatten walked home 3 M's in 2nd inning. Dixie Walker came through with a bottom 9th inning HR off Higbe for a stunning 7-6 win. 'Birds made it respectable in finale, 4-2, on a Pat Seerey bases loaded 9th inning flare.. Luke Appling went 12/30 for 'Birds, Seerey 10/26 and Judnich (M's) was 11/32 with 9 RBI.... The Bears turned on the firepower in their 3 home series, belting 23 HRs and scoring 104 runs in 21 games. Acorns came to town and took series 4-3. With 2-out in opener, Glenn McQuillen doubled home winner as Tex Hughson went distance in 3-2 win. Game 2 was tied at 2-2 in 6th when Mike Tresh doubled home winner and Spud Chandler had a CG for 4-2 victory. Down 3-1 in 9th, Bears stormed back on Ed Robinson's 2-run PH HR. Dave Philley won it with a 3-run shot 6-3. Pecky Suder drove home winner in 11th of #4, 6-5 Bears. Game 5 was a showcase for Ralph Kiner, 3-4, 2 HR-4 RBI in an 8-5 win behind Ellis Kinder. No contest in sixth game as Tex Hughson fired a 1-hitter in 11-0 game..

Acorns won finale in 10th inning 3-2 on Al Libke single...The sputtering White Sox came to town and Bears took four. Kiner singled home winning run in 9th of opener 5-4 and then, Herman Besse fired a CG 6-2 win. Bears made it 3 straight with a 9-2 win with Suder going 3-5. Sox bounce back with an 11-7 win as Bob Elliot goes 2-3 4 RBI. With sacks full in 9th, Kiner fans and Robinson bounces into DP to preserve Sox win. Frank Colman's 3-run shot caps an 8-run 8th in Bears 11-5 win. Eddie Waitkus leads Sox to an 8-2 win in #6 and in #7, Roy Hughes goes 4-6, Ted Williams triples and HRs and Dick Fowler goes all the way in 7-1 win to end series on respectable note.. Death struggle against Marauders won by the "other" Lombardi, Ernie, with 4-4 4 RBI and ex-M's hurler Al Hollingsworth leads 5-2 win. AV rebounds behind Mickey Haefner 6-5 with Pete Reiser leading offense. A wild one in #3 with AV ahead 9-5 after 6 1/2, Bears pick up unearned run in 7th, 2 in 8th (1 UE) and 2 in 9th with Gus Niarhos' SF the game winner. Frank Colman and John Lindell hammer 2-run HRs in 7th for 10-6 Bears win. A 4-3 AV win in #5 on a Mark Christman single. Enos Slaughter goes 3-5, 4 RBI and Roy Cullenbine 3-4 leads 9-2 AV win. AV wins key #7 contest behind hitting of Frank Gustine and Tommie Brown 10-7.....



Locked in a tough pennant fight, the Fortress put together a pair of 5-2 series wins over the Federals and Monarchs. And on the road, Hal Newhouser threw the 4th no-hitter of the campaign, a 5-1 stifling of the crosstown Rossville Hornets.

In the opener against the Federals, Ray Mueller popped a 2-run bingle in the 5th for a 5-4 win for Hank Wyse over Sam Zoldak. Newhouser went the distance and got support from Jake Jones' 2-run HR for a 3-1 victory. Up 8-0 in the 7th, Joe Page goes haywire and Russ Bauers comes on to uphold the 9-5 win. Jake Caufield popped a 3-run PH shot for Feds. Fours were wild as it was 4th straight, 4-1 win in #4 affair led by a Johnny Mize 3-run HR. Ralph Branca turned the tables for the Feds in #5. Tied 8-8, Stan Rojek, who entered game late as PR, singled home winner off Fred Schmidt to make it five in a row. Bob Adams, Jake Jones, George Kell and Stan Musial all homered. Federals pulled out final two as Mace Brown walked home winner in 8th, tagging Wyse with loss and in finale, Clyde Shoun outduels Newhouser as Harry Walker's 3-run HR bested Sherm Lollar's solo shot....The Monarchs came into the lair and bested Warren Spahn in the opener 6-4 behind Ken Heintzelman and Mueller's key triple. Fort turned on the power in 2nd, winning 8-5, led by strange power source, pitcher Boo Ferriss' 2-run HR in 8-run 2nd inning...Monarchs broke an 8-8 tie in 7th and won 11-7 with only HR a 3-run blast by Charlie Keller.. Newhouser was shaky in opening frame, allowing 2 runs, but settled down for 5-2 triumph. After a day of rest, Monarchs blasted their way to a 12-4 win. Wyse blew up in 8th, with score 4-4. He and Branca allowed 8 big runs over final two on HRs by Thurm Tucker, Ed Stevens and Spahn. It was come-from-behind time for Fort picking up 4 in 8th and win 9-8. Both Chet Laabs and Mize hammered two taters apiece to support Oscar Judd. Finale saw Keller explode for two HRs and Ferriss pick up 2nd win. Earl Caldwell preserved 4-2 triumph with 2nd save beating Dizzy Trout..... One of the two prime contenders for the East title, the '45 division champ Dodgers hung close taking a 4-3 series at the Redbirds. A throwing error by the usually reliable Lee Handley

at 3B opened the gates for 5 Ohio runs and a 7-6 rain delayed victory. Birds went up 2-0 in series led by Pat Seerey's 3-run HR off Ed Wright, 6-3. Joe Hatten picked up the win with help from Joe Berry. Dodgers bounced back against Berry in #3 as he came on with the score 1-1 in 9th, walked Bobby Brown for the go-ahead run and a Dom DiMaggio SF led a 3-1 win for Bill Voiselle. The Brooks were shut down on 5-hits by Roger Wolff in #4, 3-0. Phil Marchildon and Higbe started, but in the 11th, it was Berry and Russ Christopher, making his 5th appearance of the series on the mound. Dodgers scored 5 and Christopher helped with a 2-run single. Brooks took #6 as Christopher came on again for a win, 7-4. The rubber game went to Brooklyn, 3-2 in 10. Down 2-1 in 9th, DiMaggio greeted reliever Sid Hudson with a HR and Dan Litwhiler's SF in 10th drove home Buddy Kerr with the winning run.....



Dodgers fared much better at home, although struggled mightily against the Hornets, taking six. Nick Etten's 3-run shot in 5th put Rossville up by one, then Dodgers jumped on Fred Hutchinson for 5 in 6th, adding runs on a bases loaded walk and a passed ball, plus singles by Ray Sanders and Andy Seminick for 7-3 win. Last minute heroics again as Litwhiler punched a 9th inning single off Ken Gables and 3-2 margin.. Brooks were down 4-1 in 5th inning of game 3 for Marchildon when they exploded, in unusual fashion: for 4 in 5th, 6 in 6th and 2 in 7th on way to a 13-6 win and sweep of first three. Hornets notched a win in #4 as Dutch Leonard and Ralph Hamner battled thru a 4-4 tie after 7. Al Evans hit a 2-run HR in 8th, Kerr cut it close with a solo in bottom and Grady Hatton doubled in the insurance run in 9th for a 7-5 win. Litwhiler provided the winning run in #5,

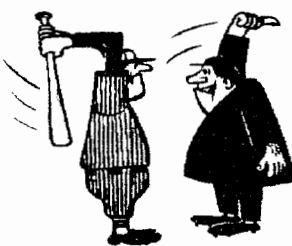
a 6th inning shot off Mickey Harris, leading Al Gerhauser to a win in his first start of the year, 4-3. Again tied, this time 1-1 after 8, Dodgers got a 2-run single from Litwhiler and a 2-run HR by weak-hitting Joe Gordon for a 5-2 win. Another 1-run affair in the finale as Dodgers won 3-2 on a Tommy Holmes 7th inning single off Hutchinson after a botched hit-and-run play...The first place Marauders began defense of their title against their division opposition, as the Elephants came to town. The circus-like atmosphere was evident as Benny Zientara hit a grand salami in the opener for a 4-1 Evanston win. Ed Lopat bested Howie Pollett in 2nd by 4-3. Visitors came back from 9-1 deficit as the AVM defense falls apart with SIX errors. Evanston nets 8 in 8th, AVM comes back on Frank Gustine HR to lead 11-9, but get stomped with 2 runs in 9th for tie and give up winner on an error in 14th to lose 14-11. M's even series as Vic Lombardi, fresh off no-hitter, gets a 7-0 lead but Joe D. homers and Evanston adds 3 to cut eventual score to 7-4.
