LIMPING TO THE HITS: '45 STYLE

Beginning any baseball writeup with the phrase, "On a cold and blustery April day" is almost as cliche ridden as starting a novel with the phrase, "it was a dark and stormy night," but here goes.

On a cold and blustery April day, the traditional opener involving the league's oldest franchise, the Ohio Redbirds, took place amidst glorious news of stirring victories over a fast-fading Nazi regime and the recent fall of Iwo Jima in the Pacific. Vice-President Harry Truman, pinch-hitting for an ailing Franklin Delano Roosevelt, threw out the first pitch. Unfortunately, the Redbirds' guests, the Rossmoor Bears, spoiled the party by "ruffing up" Bird starter Red Ruffing and coasting to a 13-2 victory.

In a later series, the Redbirds were victimized by the Antelope Valley Marauders, who won all five games in the last at bat and swept the series despite outscoring the Birds by only seven runs! In other action, the Chicago Whales pounded out 20 hits and scored 10 runs in the 6th inning of a 16-5 massacre over the Fairfield Federals. The Feds' Rube Fischer was forced to go the distance and saw his ERA soar into the stratosphere. Those self-same Federals scored two runs in the last of the 9th to edge the White Sox 6-5 and hand Al Benton a 15-hit complete game victory.

The White Sox were handed two unearned runs in the 11th inning and edged the Lafayette Gold Sox 5-3. The Lafayette crew scored two runs in the last of the 5th off the Elephants' ace reliever, Andy Karl and won 6-5. The Brooklyn Dodgers turned that scenario into a broken record as they scored 3 in the last of the 9th and 1 in the last of the 11th to edge the Pachyderms twice. The Trolley Dodgers rapped out 19 hits in a 15-9 victory over the Glendale Acorns. Hal Newhouser of the Hornets pitched two fine games against the Elephants, but lost the first 3-2 by walking in the winning run in the last of the 9th and after throwing no-hit ball for 5 innings, lost the second 3-2 as all Elephant runs were unearned.

The Rossmoor Bears had a couple of barnburners against the Federals. The first was a 14-inning marathon, won by the "Large Furry Mammals" 2-1 es first round pick Ken Burkhart pitched 7 inning of relief to pick up the win. In the 11th, the Feds had two men cut down at the plate. In the 5th game of the series, the Bears got three consecutive pinchhits in the last of the 9th and won 3-2.

The pennant races are shaping up as two team affairs in both leagues. In the East, the



Frankfort Fortress broke from the gate with a stunning 17-3 record, followed closely by the Dodgers at 15-5. All other teams in the division are under .500. The West was a little closer, but the Marauders had a 1/2 game lead

over the defending champion Whales with two other teams four games out.

The team of the month was the FRANKFORT FORTRESS who hit .301, but even more amazing had a 2.13 ERA and allowed only four home runs in 20 games! (Ed. note-Dodgers permitted 3 HR in 20 games).

Chuck Workman of the Dodgers was Player of the Month as he hit .397 and had a wide lead in both homers (9) and RBIs (29). "Boo" Ferriss of the Fortress won Pitcher of the Month honors in a close race with teammate Van Lingle Mungo. In fact, the peir combined for a 6-0 record with a 1.03 ERA! Reliever of the month was Andy Karl of the Elephants who fashioned a 4-1 record with 1 save and only allowed one earned run in 15 innings covering eight appearances.


While it may have rivaled the deal consumated in SPB I between the Tigers and Cubs in quantity, it was hardly a deal of quality ball- players.

THE "SISLER" FORMULA

Jim Wheeler has come across the following formula to measure pitcher effectiveness. Named after that great baseball family, the DiMaggio's (no!), the Sisler Formula evaluates a hurler's achievementsoutside of the overall team performance. According to the article, an average pitcher finishes at a 1.0 average rate for a career. Here it is:

(BB*1.3) + H-K/ip

For example, `57 draftees Billy O'Dell rates out at .71 over his career while Jack Sanford has a career mark of .82.



AROUND THE HORN......The Newsletter of Seasons Past



Time to once again pull out the old secret ballot and take advantage of that SPB privilege of voting. Here we have THREE potential administrative rule changes which would become part of our By-Laws beginning with the 1958 and 1947 seasons.

The votes will be tabulated by Judge Wheeler and announced immediately following the '57 draft.

- All teams will protect 19 players at the end of the season. This will eliminate the current arrangement of 18 for sub-.500 teams, 19 for over-.500 clubs and 20 for each division winner. Any team protecting 14 or lewer players will receive an additional first round draft pick. These teams will pick after the original first
 - round is completed, but before the 1st pick of the 2nd round. The order of these BONUS ROUND picks will be based upon team record, from worst to best. These selections would NOT be tradeable.
- At the conclusion of the season, a 2-week trading period will be implemented prior to the submission of final protected lists. This will allow teams to trade those players who are on the iringe but have some value to other teams.

Game 1- An 11 mph wind right to left with two lefty aces, John Antonelli vs. Whitey Ford. Bauer homered in the 4th for a 1-0 Tiger lead which was short-lived as Monte Irvin doubled and White singled to knot the score. In the 5th, Mazeroski reached on Mathews' error which moved Randy Jackson to 3rd where he scored on a sac fly by Groth for a 2-1 lead. Tigers took lead in 6th when Musial lost Hodges' fly in the LF Yankee Stadium sun, but Bil was nailed at 3rd trying to stretch the double. Tigers KO'd Antonellli in 6th when he loaded the bases on two walks and a single and Ford squeezed home the go-ahead run after lackson's single tied the game. Snider HR in 7th took lead again, but that man Jackson singled home 2 for a 6-4 lead, the eventual final score. Srissom shut the door in the 9th for the



Game 2-Mays jumped on Tom Brewer for 2 in 1st on singles by Musial and Rhodes after a Reese error. Tigers came back on solo HR from Bailey in 5th and Snider in 8th and Mathews single. One more in 7th and it looked good for Tigers until 8th when Pilarcik walked, Wilson singled and Mazeroski singled home a run when Bailey dropped the throw to the plate from Bauer. McDougald's single drove home the 3rd run of the inning for a 5-4 lead. Grissom held the Tigers at bay in the 9th, 1-2-3.

Same 3-The home field proved no advantage for the Bengals due to Randy Jackson's Grand Salami off Jack Harshman in the 4th. The Tigers gnawed back with HRs from Bauer and Mantle in the 8th, but Grissom came on to save it for Willard Schmidt. Manager Cascarano said later that if playing at home, he would have taken out Schmidt after the first HR and was fortunate the computer manager made the road decision when it did for a 6-3 win.

Same 4-Dazed and confused the Tigers were never in this one. Paul Foytack allowed 7 walks in 3+ innings and Hersh Freeman couldn't quell the Mavs' attack. Even HRs by Mentle, Hodges and Reese couldn't keep the lans in their seats until the end as the Mavs raced to a 10-4 triumph and a sweep.
