FALCONS, CUBS CAPTURE 1ST TITLES AFTER WILD RACES- -CUBS WIN '57 IN WS SWEEP

Swooping down like a vulture after surveying the carnage left behind in the battle for the '57 Western title, the Gurnee Falcons of Frank Papp survived and flew away with their first SPB pennant. And the Falcons pocketed the first no-hitter of the campaign!


In a game at the Saxons, young Von McDantel, the young Gurnee pheenom who would quickly exit stage right from the majors, went the first 8.1, striking out 8 and walking 4 before he was picked up by another rookie, Dick Farrell who nailed down the final two outs. Bob Friend and Bobby Shantz allowed only five hits for the Saxons, including a HR by Earl Torgeson.

As the Rifles, Cascades, Bluebirds and defending champion Mavericks played demolition derby in head-to-head games, the Falcons held fast. Entering the final month with a four game lead, the Mavs were fully confident that they could withstand the intra-divisional battle and another trip to the World Series.

The Rifles then knocked the Mavs from their saddle by taking 5-of-7 at home. In the interim, the Cascades went 10-4 at home winning 5-of-7 from both the Falcons and last place Black Sox. On the road, the Bluebirds toppled Pacific with the same 5-2 mark.

Then the Internet lines began working overtime. The Rifles' Bob Calicchia kept the Cascades' Lou Ross informed of series progress and the angst could be heard through the lines. Needing to win by 2 games to gain a portion of first place, the Rifles lost the opener 4-3, but George Crowe's 10th inning HR off Jim McDonald evened the series. The Rifles won games 3 and 4, but Pacific thrashed

Vinegar Bend Mizell in game 5, got a zip from Don Newcombe in the 6th and finished the series by winning game 7, 8-4, on a HR by Roy Campanella in his final game. By losing the last three, the Rifles fell to 87-67 and into that wild 4-way tie for second in the West.

Commissioner's Forum

Time to take care of some of those nagging administrative details with both Seasons Past Baseball leagues.

There was some concern amongst several managers about the time of each draft and the beginning of the next season.

Thus, I would like to standardize the procedure for future drafts to allow managers to fully plan ahead.

Each new SPB season will begin three (3) months after the conclusion of the previous season. For example, SPBII-46 will conclude at the end of January '96. This means that the new SPBII-47 will begin on May 1, 1996.

Each season's rookie draft will be held no sooner than 30 days after the conclusion of the last season and no later than 60 days. Again, using SPBII-47 as an example, the Rookie Draft will be held in March 1996. Hopefully, this will help in time planning.

Next, there will be NO penalties for overuse with the '57 season. All managers are cautioned to plan and allocate their resources accordingly. There should be NO excuse for overuse of starting pitchers and future overuse will not be looked upon favorably.

The draft order for 58 is on page six.

'46 OPENING MONTH SHOWS PROMISE OF TOUGH RACES - - -'45 WINNERS LEAD IN REPEAT HOPES

With the war over and the discharge from the military of such stars as Ted Williams, Joe DiMaggio, Bob Feller, et al the 1946 season promises to be very exciting. Results from the first month confirmed this feeling with close races shaping up in both divisions.

Five teams in the West, but only two in the East sported winning records at the end of April which might indicate a shift in power which follows the sun. In the East, the Dodgers had a one game lead over the Gold Sox, with the pre-season

favorite Fortress stumbling at the starting gate, three back. In the West, the defending champion Marauders clung to a 1/2 game lead over the Whales.

Charlie "King Kong" Keller led the league with a .344 mark while Hammering Hank Greenberg led in homers with 8, with Keller only one back. Johnny VanderMeer of the Trees and Murry Dickson of the Whales shared the league lead with 4 wins each.

The Dodgers were defeated thy he Acorns in their home opener 1-0 as Tex Hughson allowed only 3 its and fanned 12 on a cold rainy day. The Brooks rebounded to sweep the remaining four, including game two on an Andy Seminick 16th inning homer and and 11th inning shot by Leon Culberson in game four. Ralph Hamner spun a 6-hit shutout in the finale.

Jack Wallesea of the Monarchs, a lighthitting shortstop had a career game versus the Acorns going 5-5 drove in 7 runs and hit for the cycle. The Kings lost 8-3 to the Elephants despite outhitting the Pacyderms 9-6, but 15 walks led to the loss.

Antelope Valley swept the Federals all five, allowing only six runs in the last four games. The Whales scored two runs in the top of the 9th to edge the Feds 6-5 and Fairfield almost returned the favor the next day with a 2-run 9th inning rally, but fell short by the same 6-5 score. The Rossville Hornets "squeezede" out a 2-0 victory over Johnny Sain and the Trees as Emil Verban squeezed home both runs. Al Gionfriddo's two run single in the 9th gave the Oaks a 3-2 win as the Hornets squandered 9 walks.

A six-run 10th gave the White Sox a 9-3 win over the Federals. They then turned around and swept five from the Redbirds, allowing only 10 runs in the series, five in one game.


The question last month was: Which current SPB skipper once participated in a championship game on the same court as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar?

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK



Off the soapbox this month. No burning issues, nothing to stir up the waters about, thankfully. Just some thoughts on Mickey Mantle.

As much as we all knew we were being prepared for his death after the liver transplant and subsequent deteriorating cancer condition, the news was a definite shock. As I watched SPORTS WEEKL You the morning of August 13th and saw the black and white footage of Mantle's career, I just looked at my wife and said, "My God, he's dead." And I was hardly embarassed when I began to cry in front of the boys.

There were no words to explain how great he was, how large he loomed in the daily psyche of a New York youngster in the 50s and 60s. He was baseball!

That familiar gait racing after a fly ball in the deepest section of Yankee Stadium, flicking out the glove and making the catch has remained etched. And that classic swing, the tensing of his facial muscles as he slammed another mammoth homer, ambling home, head down crossing home plate is a portrait that can never be captured again.

I met Mantle once at Yankee Stadium, when covering games in the seventies. Nothing special, just a simple "Hi ya."

But there was one afternoon as a 15 year old, sitting down in the first row on the first base side at the Stadium when I got goose bumps. There was Mantle, those massive arms swinging a bat in the

The mighty Frankfort Fortress lost 3-5 to the lowly Glendale Acorns as they surrendered 38 runs in the series which included a shutout win. The Elephant defense committed six errors in a game against the Gold Sox, but eventually won on a Sox error in the 9th.

The Whales swept the hardluck Redbirds as Murry Dickson won three in relief and Junior Thompson notched 4 saves. Later in the month, the Orcas blasted the Monarchs 18-1. The Elephants swept the Hornets, but needed 4 one-run and one two-run wins.

It was difficult to select the team of the month, particularly given the disparity in games played. Antelope Valley had the best percentage, but the Whales won more games. Given the Chicago dominance in stats (first in ERA, third in BA, 2nd in runs), the honor goes to the Whales by a whisper.

The only serious contenders for player of the month were Charlie Keller and Hank Greenberg. Keller hit .384 with a .505 OBA and 7 HRs. Hank had the benefit of 5 more games and hit .348, 8-25. The honor goes to Keller in a close vote.

Johnny VanderMeer of the Trees was the runaway winner as Pitcher-of-the-Month. He completed and won all four tarts, including two shutouts and a 1.25 EHA.

The two contenders for Reliever-of-the-Month were Junior Thompson (Whales) and Ken Burkhardt (Bears). Thompson had 6 saves and a win in 7 appearances and a 2.84 ERA while Burkhardt had a win a 4 saves in 5 appearances but a 0.00 ERA. The nod goes to Burkhardt.



Reflections

In this chapter of "Diamond Memories," the Creator, Rocket and Doc rub elbows with the greats.

A few months back, Commissioner Wheeler and Editor Ross solicited articles about our

memories of a distinct subculture called "gamers." In my last episode, Gary Plunkitt, Rick Ryan and yours truly grew up....sort of. In any case, we passed through several APBA and Replay mail leagues, got married (sometimes twice), had families and eventually, purchased personal computers, which have made Jim Wheeler's SPB leagues "necessary" to paraphrase Yogi.

In this chapter, SPB's own Dr. Diamond (alias Steve Ehresman) will recount those brief, infrequent, but always memorable encounters we had with baseball's "Boys of Summer," many of whom fill the rosters of SPB I & II.

To begin with, Gary has had MANY more encounters with ex-players, as he has traveled to card shows, SABR conventions and even the homes of several major leaguers: Bill Voiselle of SPB II, for example. Gary has spent a lot of time talking to personable stars, such as Enos Slaughter, Warren Spahn and Bill Mazeroski and has brought me back autographed 8x10s. On occasion, Rick has traveled with SPB's "Creator" and despite his relatively slow start as a baseball fan, has met and chatted with his share of greats and not-so-greats. I, however, will recount a few episodes involving me or the three of us, who have all experienced the agony and the

My worst experience in autograph collecting came at the hand of two-time MVP and HOFer Frank Robinson. In the early 1980's, to my amazement, Benton Central High School's head baseball coach arranged a Sunday afternoon clinic in the Benton gym featuring "major league stars." This sounded intriguing, but ambiguous. I wasn't sure whom to expect, but a supernova like Frank Robinson FAR exceeded my expectations. In addition, Gary Lavelle, who would have been enough for me, came along as a "warm up act."

On a cold, wintry January afternoon, Robinson did indeed come to the corn fields of Benton County, Indiana, for a two-hour coaches clinic. Though I was NOT a coach, our head coach, who had organized the visit from an Olympian, assured me I was welcome and that "Frank" (He called him "Frank") would be "happy" to sign an autograph for me. Rick showed up too because, in the early '80's, he was Rossville High School's baseball coach. The kid I had punished for



years in mismatched APBA and Replay contests had indeed grown up. Gary (Lord bless him!) sent me a Robinson rookie card for the former-Red, former-Oriole to sign. At the time, I did not know how much many ex-major leaguers, especially those who had enjoyed great careers before free agency, salary arbitration and \$25 a crack autographs, HATED baseball cards. Many of them viewed cards, especially autographed cards, as a way for yuppie investors to make a buck off their names without their getting a single cent. Given what has happened to the card and memorabilia hobby, who could blame

them. Nevertheless, Gary had set me up to play John the Baptist to Frank Robinson's Herod and I would feel fortunate to leave the gym with my head on my shoulders, not a platter.

Before Robinson's presentation began, I sought out the Benton coach and he reassured me that Frank would be glad to sign my cards and that I should go into the locker room and ask him to sign now. NOW? YES. NOW (Oh, the bravado of those who do not have to face an angry god.) Painfully conscious that I was somehow violating an unwritten, but widely understood cosmic law (30something English teachers do not venture into the lair....the domain....of HOFers, even if those HOFers are visiting the English teachers' school), I approached the locker room, opened the door and suddenly was in the same room as FRANK ROBINSON. He was shorter than I expected, but his presence filled the room, radiating confidence and command and silently speaking of accomplishments that people like me can only dream about.

I approached the silent Robinson who saw me, paused in his conversation and regarded me with a puzzled look. I had to speak, but the adult in me had NO words. Who stood before Robinson was a mute, awkward 10-year old. The silence lasted a few seconds. Then I said, "Mr. Robinson, Coach said I could come in and ask you for an autograph."

More silence. Robinson regarded me cooly. "He didn't say I'd sign, did he?"
This time I was quick to reply: "No sir.."
Without a word, he held out his hand, took Gary's card, frowned but signed a very legible signature and handed the card back to me. I hadn't noticed how LARGE his hands were until that moment, hands that could hold a bat like a toothpick and get around on a 90 mph fastball in less than a wink. I almost trembled, but tried to smile and make my voice loud enough for him to hear.

Think about it. He is one of the biggest reasons we are doing what we are today in SPB.



CUBBIES DECLAW FALCONS IN ANOTHER WORLD SERIES SWEEP

For the second consecutive season, the SPBI title was decided in a rather stunning four-game sweep.

It was quite surprising in 1956 when the upstart Mavericks blew out the Tigers in four and it was almost equally surprising when the other Franfort entry, the Rossville Cubs hung a collar on the Western Division champion Gurnee Falcons.

Some deft off-season trades and acquisitions by Cubs' skipper Rick Ryan finally brought the SPBI-57 World Series championship to the Eastern Division. Ryan put together a veteran ballclub which did not falter down the stretch of the pennant race against the Pelicans.

With perhaps the most formidable middle-of-the-order lineup imaginable, with Willie Mays-Eddie Mathews- Ernie Banks, the Cubs played longball at both the friendly confines of Wrigley Field and at Sportsmans Park.

Here's a capsule of the sweep and it wasn't a pretty site. The games were played face-to-face by Ryan and Frank Papp.

Game 1—The winds were blowing to left field on a crisp autumn afternoon at Wrigley as 5 homers sailed over the now rust-colored ivy.

The Falcons jumped out early on Ted Williams' 1st inning single, but the Cubs came right back. Eddie Mathews, appearing in his second straight Series, poled a 2-run shot for the lead. Gurnee retook the lead in the 4th on a Hal Smith homer off Paul Foytack, but the Falcons could have quick played the rest of the way.

Falcons' starter Duke Maas had settled

down after the Mathews shot, but in the 5th, after a leadoff bunt single by Foytack and two outs, the walls came tumbling down. Consecutive singles by the power troika led to a 4-3 lead and Papp brought on left y Don Mossi to stem the tide. Dale Long doubled home two as the matchup failed and Hank Sauer singled home another.

Mossi was there to take on for the team in the opening game as the Cubs brought home 5 in the 7th, including a 2-run pinch homer by Del Crandall. As Foytack rolled along with a 12-3 lead, the Cubs put double digits, an 11-spot, on the board in the 8th.

Pinch hit homers by Walt Dropo and Roy Smalley brought the total for the Cubs' bench to 3 for the game. Rossville sent 17 men to the plate and finished the carnage with 23 runs on 26 hits.

In game two, the Chicago winds blustered early and the Falcons showed some pop with 3 consecutive HRs in the 1st against Hal Jeffcoat, another off-season acquisition from the Grays via the Cascades. With one out, Earl Torgeson, Frank Robinson and Ted Williams played HR derby for a 3-0 lead.

Ryan switched his lineup, moving Mays to the leadoff slot against southpaw Danny McDevitt. Banks' doubled in the bottom and to cut it 3-1. When Jeffcoat walked Gilliam to force in a run in the 4th, Ryan brought on the hook and in came Murry Dickson to put out the fire and hold the deficit to 4-1.

McDevitt faltered in the 4th and was replaced by Mike Garcia who did not fare well, allowing a single to Mays and a sac fly by Billy Gardner and the lead was 4-3.

Ray Narleski held the Talons in check

and in the 6th, Dale Long doubled home one to tie and on came Bud Byerly. Daryl Spencer and Ken Boyer each booted two grounders and the Cubs had a 7-4 lead.

The Falcons rallied against a tiring Clevenger in the 9th. With one down, Robinson singled and Williams doubled him to third. Boyer grounded to short and one came in to cut the lead to 7-5. With the tying run at the plate in Rip Repulski, Ryan made a gutsy decision by keeping Clevenger in the game. He was rewarded as Repulski fanned to end the game.

Could home cooking help the Falcons?
Game three at Sportsmans Park saw
Connie Johnson (or was it Connie
Stevens?)on the mound for the Falcons
opposed by Willard Nixon. With Mays
moved back to the three hole, the Cubs
jumped out with a large 5-spot in the first.

Jungle Jim Rivera doubled and was moved up on a Gardner bunt single. Mays doubled him home and Papp elected to walk Mathews to load the sacks.

However, the strategy backfired as Ernie Banks launched one deep for a grand salami and an insurmountable 5-0 margin.

Johnson was still tossing BP in the 4th when Hank Sauer went deep and with two down, Rivera did the same. Rookie Von McDaniel came on and hurled through the 7th, allowing only a single to Nixon. He also drove home the only run on a bounce out to 3B in the 4th, but that was it.

With the local media closely scrutinizing every move of the Falcons during the opening three contests, the Cubs were relaxed prior to game four at Sportsmans Park, knowing full well that a loss would still keep them only one away from Nirvana.

The Falcons got on the board with one in the 6th. With two down, Robinson singled and Williams drove him home with a double to the gap.

Banks doubled and after Longbounced out moving up the runner, Jim Busby, batting for Dusty Rhodes, drove home run five. Wilson was tiring in the 9th and after allowing singles to Boyer and Repulski, on came Clem Labine to get the next two hitters, Smith and Jim Brideweser.

Pinch-hitter Joe Caffie punched a single through the infield and then, Labine bore down.

As the stunned home crowd looked on, Jim Gilliam, in what turned out to be his final at bat as a Falcon, skied one in front of the plate. Del Crandall flipped the mask, moved in front of home plate and caressed the ball as it fell gently into his mitt.

In the WIND broadcast booth, Jack Quinlan, Gene Elston and Milo Hamilton went wild while Jack Brickhouse and Vince Lloyd rollicked over on the national telecast.

After the series, Manager Ryan was proud to announce his triumph, but was quick to thank Frank Papp for an excellent series. Frank was very gracious in defeat, saying it was just one of those things. Coming across a pack of hungry bears lurking in the woods is never a pleasant experience. Especially those loaded with the veteran power these Cubs maintained.

The Cubs came back from a sluggish start, coming out of hibernation during the final four months of the 1957 campaign by posting a 69-35 record and proving the pre-season prognostications correct with the most formidable club in the league.

And next season, the Cubs bring in Billy Bruton to patrol CF. as the ongoing rebuilding process continues.
